
PE: We have been working on building our stamina and climbing ropes!

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Forest School: We have been learning more about the lifecycle of plants.

Marian Procession:

The whole school braved the rain and wind to persevere with our Rosary Mission and present flowers to Mary. It was a beautiful occasion and Father Keith and Deacon Mark read scripture between our prayers. The children were reverent and sang Marian hymns to honour Our Lady.



So, What Have We Been Doing ..?

Birch and Oak:

We have been enjoying our Enchanted Woodland topic. In our English lessons we watched an exciting video clip about a 'Tree House' that came to life. We then wrote about our own magical tree houses.

In Art we have been experimenting by mixing different coloured paints. We then used our skills to paint woodland animals. We have also enjoyed making tree boggarts out of clay!

Sycamore:

Plants: This half term we have been completing our Science investigations about plants. We attempted to grow cress and investigate whether the amount of light affected the way the plants grew. We discovered that the cress grew the best in the light rather than in the cupboard. No surprise there you might think, the cress that was placed on the window cill, grew green leaves whilst the seeds in the cupboard still grew leaves but they were yellow. We concluded that seeds need water to grow properly.

We were keen to establish a fair test, so all the other factors were the same; the amount of water given, the growing medium used (cotton wool). We have had a lot more success growing peas, beetroot and radishes. This helped us to establish what is needed to grow a healthy plant. We also learnt the functions of different parts of a plant.

Animals: We learnt to classify animals, especially vertebrates: mammals, reptiles, birds, amphibians and fish. We then enhanced our learning about minibeasts by creating a tally chart to learn how to present data. In Maths we have been learning about division, sharing equally and starting to find fractions of a number of objects.

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Ash have been exploring farming. They have researched and compared a local farm (Washingpool) with a citrus farm in California. They have also discovered how far some of our food travels to get to our plates.

A banana can travel an amazing 3921 miles in a ship and a truck to get to the shop before we can buy it!

Hazel:

We have been looking at free verse poetry including rap. This included a rap battle and writing our own free verse poetry using a range of figurative language techniques!

In maths, we have been looking at units of measure including money. We have been trying to convert between the different units of measure and measured things around the school which we then needed to convert.

In topic we have been learning about why different things grow in different places and how the different climates affect where things grow. We have been looking at a case study of California, trying a variety of citrus fruits and then creating art based on this.

Maple:

Maple have been looking at the lungs and how to keep them healthy. Persuasive writing has been the main English topic; therefore, they have been experimenting with different styles of writing, creating posters, designing leaflets, and creating their own TV adverts.

On National Numeracy Day, they planned and taught maths lessons to the Y3's. This was to build their confidence and help them to reason about maths. The Y3's really enjoyed it and hopefully learnt a lot!

Personal, Social, Health and Economic education:

I know it's tricky, but it is so important! We have been learning the names of body parts and also learning that your private parts are private! This topic has been taught very sensitively by our wonderful teachers and we are grateful for your support as parents and carers.

Bottle Tops:

This is the best news EVER!! You know we all collect the milk bottle tops and never actually know what to do with them, well... Miss Cross would like them for an ART project after half term! So, tell Nanna, tell Grumps, tell Auntie Jenny to grab their bag (and we ALL have a bag of them!) of tops and bring them in on Tuesday 8th June.

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Bikeability:

Ben from Bikeablility came in today (Friday 28th May) to work with Maple on their bike skills. Learning to ride a bike is a rite of passage for a child and learning to ride it safely, with care and sensibly is essential. All our children are incredibly precious to us and we want them to be safe!

CAFOD's National G7 Action - Eyes of the World Art Instillation;

We have been invited to join Eyes of the World campaign ahead of the G7 summit this June and the UN climate talks in November.

What is the G7 summit:

The G7 Leaders' Summit in 2021 is presided over by the UK and aims to unite leading democracies to help the world build back better from the COVID-19 pandemic and create a greener, more prosperous future.
